**"Navigating the New York and Federal
Censuses with Fewer Tears...and More"**

Joel Weintraub, Ph.D.

Census schedules are one of the most important resources of genealogists. The US census has been taken every 10 years since 1790. Many states including New York State have independent enumerations-(e.g. 1905, 1915, and 1925) which are not on line. In 1905 one out of 20 US residents and an estimated half of the US Jewish population lived in New York City-making these early 20th century censuses of vital interest to Jewish genealogists and others. Joel will discuss how the One-Step program created by Steve Morse is of critical help to genealogists in researching censuses and other programs.

Joel Weintraub is Professor Emeritus, Cal State University Fullerton. He became interested in genealogy several years ago and regularly volunteers at the National Archives. Working with Steve Morse of One-Step fame, he is responsible for database management for census conversion tables and searches on Steve Morse's website <http://stevemorse.org> Dubbed the "Generic Dr. Morse", Joel's contributions to street finder aids for finding people on the census schedules have benefited all genealogists.
